#### Entrance Antiphon Cf Psalm 24:15-16

My eyes are always on the Lord, for he rescues my feet from the snare. Turn to me and have mercy on me, for I am alone and poor.

#### **First Reading** Exodus 3:1-8. 13-15 A reading from the book of Exodus

This is what you must say to the children of Israel: I Am has sent me to you.

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-inlaw, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God.

And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.'

Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come.'

All this that happened to the people of Moses in the desert was written for our benefit.

I want to remind you how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea. They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert.

These things all happened as warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer.

All this happened to them as a warning and it was written down to be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall.

No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.'

He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down.""

#### Fr Darren's Homily from Second Sunday of Lent

In the first reading we heard how God made a promise to Abraham that his descendants would be numerous, that promise was fulfilled. Abraham didn't know how that would be fulfilled he had to trust in God. Abrahm is our father in faith, that means he shows us the importance of trusting in God.

There are number of analogies we can use to show how faith works, how it helps us. Think of a maze, if you are in a maze made up of hedges all you can see either side of you is the green hedge. If you were dropped blindfolded into the middle of the maze you wouldn't know which way to go. To find your way would be a matter of trial and error, hoping all the time you can remember the false turns you had made. If someone is looking from above they can see the way out. God sees the big picture. Faith tells us that following the commandments of Jesus is the way to live our lives. In a way sin, not following God's teachings is like somebody trying to shortcut which makes the trip longer, or even worse takes them a long a dangerous path in which there is either no way out, or it is very difficult to get out.

Have you ever met someone who has no sense of direction, who actually ignores instructions which they have been given because a road looks good to them? Trust me they exist. Faith tells us that times we need to ignore our feelings.

Believe it or not pilots are trained to ignore their feelings about what is up and down when they are flowing through clouds or at night. A good pilot knows what to do if their feelings tell them when they are surrounded by clouds or are in pitch darkness to point the plane downwards and their instruments tell them that they are flying straight and level. They know that they have to trust their instruments, and not their feelings. John F Kennedy Jnr trusted his feelings and crashed into the ocean.

Our feelings can overwhelm us and confuse at times say for example when we are angry, or we are really attracted to something or someone. That is where our Faith can save us from taking the wrong path. Ironically people have been given bad directions by their GPS, been taken by narrow and rough mountain roads instead of taken along the freeway.

God wants to lead us by the best path possible for us. Faith not only tells us that God will show us the way, it also reassures us that if we pray and make use of the means God gives us that we will be able to travel the path God wants us to take.

This Sunday we celebrate the Transfiguration of Jesus. This was to prepare his disciples for the shock of the Cross, this was to encourage them to have confidence and hope.

We need to have the same amount of confidence in God as Captain Eric Moody the Pilot of a British Airways Boeing 747 had in his Rolls Royce Engines. The engines ingested huge amounts of volcan ash in what has gone down in aviation history as the Jakarta incident

"Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. This is your captain speaking. We have a small problem. All four engines have stopped. We are all doing our damnedest to get them going again. I trust you are not in too much distress."

Eventually, after quarter of an hour without any power, the engines were brought back to life. Ash had clogged the engines, which only restarted when enough of the molten ash solidified and broke off.

"We glided from 37,000ft to 12,000ft before we got [the engines] going again," recalls Capt. Moody.

Later he is reported as saying he had the greatest of confidence, after all the engines were Rolls Royce engines.
